

Dear St Michael's Parish Family and all our Friends.

Acts of mercy - the door to mission.

I am wondering..... Is God trying to tell me something? A few weeks ago I read a book called Breakout by Mark Stibbe & Andrew Williams. In the book they are telling the recent story of Church in a very different context: St Andrew's Chorleywood. They felt called by God to group themselves into smaller communities of no more than 50 adults that would share a vision to be Church together by meeting a particular need out in the community. Now, three out of four Sundays a month, these smaller groups meet out in the communities they are trying to serve, meeting in scout huts, community halls, coffee shops and the like. In 5 years they have grown (conversion growth) by 1,000 members.


It's a challenge for us all in the above example of a growing church, it's clear that we must focus on loving and serving the people within our ministry mandate in the name of Christ. The Church has a responsibility of loving people, and seeking in every way possible to meet their needs whilst sharing openly the difference that Jesus can make in their lives.

The Children's Society

Six months ago The Children's Society launched a report entitled A Good Childhood . This report highlighted the importance of family ensuring good childhood - the unconditional love that should come naturally between a child and parent or carer. Sadly, many children do not have this precious time in their early years, as family relationships breakdown, and they end up running away from home.

The Children's Society works from their Children's Centres in many of our large cities, supporting parents to develop these vital strong relationships early on. In their Safe in the City projects they support young people who are running away from home on an increasingly frequent basis. Here young people have a safe place to come to, project workers they can talk to and trust, opportunities to meet other young people, enjoy activities and build confidence and resilience to get through difficult times.

At St Michael's, with Norma's enthusiasm and commitment over many years, we have supported the work of the Society through our annual Christingle Service, Norma's "Coffee Mornings" and home box collections.

We still have a number of box holders who, as you will see from Norma's report elsewhere in this magazine, have raised over £500 in the last 12 months. The number of box holders has reduced in recent years and it would be good to have some more. So if you have a small space at home for one of the boxes in which to deposit your loose change or a regular coin (or 2 or 3) please speak to Norma or to me. It's surprising how it all adds up at the end of 12 months. Thank you.

BACK TO CHURCH SUNDAY

Everyone knows that in most English parishes the numbers of people attending church regularly have been going down for many years. Our parish is no exception. This year, with this in mind, the English churches have designated 27 September as 'Back to Church Sunday'. The main service of the day – here at St. Michael's, this is the Sung Eucharist at 9.30 a.m. – will give special expression to the interests of people who have lost the church-going habit.

What does church attendance offer to those who, having been baptised and confirmed, are willing to call themselves Christians? Two thousand years of Christian devotion have provided a great wealth of ideas. Here are a few personal thoughts.

Public worship, especially joining in the celebration of the Lord's Supper (celebrated by the parish priest) is a point of personal contact with Jesus our Saviour. By the help of God's Holy Spirit, we receive the promise of Eternal Life in Him.

In the course of public worship, our understanding of Jesus' love for us grows in the public reading of the Bible - which is the source of God's revelation to us his people and is the ever-living Gospel of his only begotten Son, Jesus – and in having it expounded in a sermon or otherwise.

The worshipping community is the local body of Christians, all of us seeking to follow the way of Jesus and to be healed of spiritual and physical infirmities, as God wills.

Because God's love is made present to us as a community in these holy things, we do together in Church what we do privately in our daily lives: we commend to God those people, events and activities that are important to us, and make our requests known to Him.

We rejoice together in expressing these important things by means of traditional prayers, ceremonies, spiritual songs and music, praises and thanksgivings;

We have a focus for mission-led events and social activities at all times.

These traditional understandings can be engaged and reinforced by modern knowledge. Take the theory of Evolution, which is in the public eye even more than usual because 2009 is the 200th anniversary of the birth of Charles Darwin; his book *The Origin of Species* was first published in 1859. There is a fascinating exhibition about Darwin's life and work at Christ's College, Cambridge, where he studied, and another at the Fitzwilliam Museum.

We need to become accustomed to seeing God's handiwork around us at all times. As a way of perceiving it, Darwin's ideas about Evolution have stood the test of time, although initially they met with all sorts of objections. Darwin was offended by some of the things that were said about him and his work. He would have been amazed by the unjustified interpretations that are sometimes bandied about today.

Such misunderstandings, among many possible reasons for giving up church, have led many to think that Christianity cannot explain the world as we now know it. But really, Darwin's ideas *help* us to understand the diversity of living things and prompt us to see how God works in and through the universe that He has made. He works through processes that we can observe in the world and in ourselves. He calls us to a process of choice between truth and error, right and wrong. It is part of the order of the world as God creates it, although the questions that arise have changed through the centuries. This process of choice is not an end in itself, but a means to an end: our choices bring us closer to God or take us further away from Him, and the process goes on through the whole of our lives.

The New Testament tells us how the early Christians faced an unfamiliar choice. Most of you who read this have already made a choice for God. On Back to Church Sunday, invite your family and friends to share it.

We in this country are very fortunate to have a clean, readily available source of water but in many parts of the world this is not the case.

Working with Water Action in Ethiopia the aim is to build a water supply for almost 55,000 people.

Water and Ethiopia

The people of Ethiopia face widespread poverty, food shortages and disease. Even survival can be a daily struggle. Having good access to safe drinking water is one of the highest priorities for local communities, as over 70% of all diseases in Ethiopia are caused by dirty water.

Water and climate change

The UN climate summit in Copenhagen in December will decide how the world combats climate change and protects vital resources like water supplies in the decades ahead. Please campaign with Christian Aid for a Copenhagen climate deal that is effective and fair - see www.christianaid.org.uk/actnow for the latest information and actions.

Water and the millennium development goals

In 2000, 189 nations, including the UK, adopted the Millennium Declaration and its eight millennium development goals (MDGs) to meet the needs of the world's poorest communities. St Albans Diocese is working with Micah Challenge UK, part of a global network of Christians, who are campaigning to hold our government to account for the promises it has made to fulfil the MDGs.

They are calling Christians to join together across the globe, to pray, take action and speak out on the injustices of poverty. One of the targets in MDG 7, 'ensuring environmental sustainability', is to reduce by half the number of people in the world without access to safe drinking water. Water Action's work will help Ethiopia to meet this target
